

WA Today

On average, regional recruitment difficulty in WA was 71% in 2022

69% of the regional WA workforce in skilled occupations

The average for regional WA students is 71%

59% of regional WA population (aged 15-74 years) has a postschool qualification

Regions score 71 out of 100

Regional ADII score is 66, with 92% of regional WA LGAs falling below the state average of 72

Regional Western Australians score 'access to public transport' an average 3.3 out of 7

The median rental vacancy rate in regional WA fell from 7.6% in June 2020 to 2.4% in June 2021. The number of homes approved for construction in regional WA declined in seven out of the ten years to

277 medical practitioners FTE per 100,000 work in regional WA, compared to 328 in regions nationally

89% of Western Australians live in a regional childcare desert, across all of WA's regional areas

The proportion of students achieving at or above the NMS decreases over year levels - in regional WA, this difference is almost triple that of metropolitan students

Regional Western Australians score 'getting involved in the community' an average 2.9 out of 7

Just over 700,000 people live in WA's regions

30% of regional WA's population are aged 15-39 years

12% of overseas arrivals settle in WA's regions

State-based disaggregation unavailable

Participation rate in regional WA was 68% in May 2021, compared to a recent height of 71% in May 2022

10% of trademarks registered and 18% of new business entries in WA were from regional WA

Disaggregation unavailable for Western Australia

21% of WA regions have a moderate to high capacity for disaster resilience
